

Participating Agencies

City of Quincy

Department of Planning and Community Development (PCD) is responsible for administration of Federal and State Grants on housing, homeless, economic development and community development. The **Office of Housing Rehabilitation (OHR)** implements programs including home and rental rehabilitation, handicapped adaptation, flood-prone retrofitting, lead hazard control, and public facilities. Council on Aging (COA) provides Quincy seniors services to ensure a high quality of life: healthy lifestyle services; support groups; fitness and sports events; recreational and social gatherings; outreach and referral services such as legal, housing assistance, and snow removal; and medical or social transportation. (Quincyma.gov/Government/ELDERSERV)

Quincy Health Department (QHD) provides services and programs to protect the health, safety and well-being of the residents of Quincy. We enforce all public health and environmental regulations for prevention and control of disease; protect residents from environmental hazards; and provide clinics and education. Non-Profit Organizations

Asian American Service Association (AASA) is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization since 1996 to serve the growing needs of the Asian community in Quincy. AASA has been one of the leading Asian organizations in Quincy to serve Asian seniors and families with children under the age of four. (AASA-MA.org)

DOVE, Inc. (Domestic Violence Ended) works with individuals, families, and communities to help them recognize their strengths and achieve their goals. Our services are designed to provide assistance and guidance in identifying safety issues and options; empower victims/survivors of abuse to make healthy choices about their own lives; and educate the community about domestic violence and ways to prevent it. Father Bill's & Mainspring (FBMS) is dedicated to ending - not simply managing - homelessness in Southeastern Mass. Our primary focus areas are housing, prevention, emergency shelter and workforce development. We deliver a range of programs and services to meet the needs of individuals facing homelessness. Interfaith Social Services (ISS) mission is to strengthen family life and offer assistance to anyone in need. Programs include: the food pantry, emotional or mental health counseling; homelessness prevention and emergency assistance; distribution center for free professional attire for low income job seekers; and a thrift shop for low cost clothing and household goods. Manet Community Health Center (MCHC) has a mission to provide quality, accessible health care for all. We have five (5) locations in Hough's Neck, Hull, North Quincy, Quincy Medical Center, and Snug Harbor. Neighborhood Housing Services of the South Shore (NHS) believes that affordable housing and stable neighborhoods help individuals and families realize their full dignity and potential. Quincy After School Child Care, Inc. (QASCC) is designed for school aged children, kindergarten through thirteen years old. We are an affordable school age program, providing care within the elementary school setting.
