

SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING REGULATIONS

October 15 to April 15

- Parking on emergency arteries during a snow emergency is prohibited. All main streets in the City are posted with signs identifying them as emergency arteries.
- Parking is allowed during a snow emergency on NON- EMERGENCY streets only.
- Each year between October 15 and April 15, emergency parking regulations are implemented. Parking is allowed on either the ODD numbered or the EVEN numbered side of non-emergency streets during a declared Snow Emergency depending upon whether it is an ODD or EVEN year on October 15th. (Example: October 15, 2005 = ODD side of the street. October 15, 2006 = EVEN side of the street)



• The side of the street remains the same October through April.

- Your car will be towed if it is in violation of any of these winter parking rules, or if it interferes in any way with plowing operations. The average tow and storage is \$125.00 or more.
- If bad weather is expected, call (617) 770-SNOW or listen to the TV or radio. If you have any problems or questions related to snow removal, call the snow hotlines at (617) 376-1943.

Streets and Sidewalks for Homes and Businesses

Let us all work together to keep our city streets and sidewalks safe, passable and profitable.

Snow Removal from Sidewalks

The tenant, occupant, and, in case there shall be no tenant, the owner of any store bordering





on any sidewalk, shall, after the fall of any snow, if in the daytime within five hours, and if in the nighttime before 1^{pm} of the succeeding day, remove the snow.

Trash Collection

The City of Quincy provides weekly curbside trash and recycling collection for its residents of one- to eight-family dwellings and condominiums

through Sunrise Scavenger. Curbside collection services are performed Monday through Friday.

- Massachusetts State Law prohibits the disposal of mercury, construction and demolition debris, paper, cardboard, bottles, cans, yard-waste, TVs, monitors, Ni-cad, Lithium and car batteries, and large appliances in the trash. Recycling

Convert one of your existing 32-gallon trash containers into a **Single Stream Recycling container** by simply applying a City supplied recycling sticker. You can still use your current recycling bin if you choose. Free Single Stream Recycle Stickers are available at the City Hall Information Desk, 1305 Hancock St., the DPW, 55 Sea Street, Monday through Friday, 8:30 A.M. to 3:30 P.M., Curry Hardware, 370 Copeland St. and Danny's Hardware, 53 Billings Rd. You may also call (617) 376-1953 or email your request to: recyclequincy@quincyma.gov to have stickers mailed.



Yardwaste

The curbside collection of yardwaste is provided 24 weeks per year on your regular trash day. Yardwaste calendars are mailed to every residence twice a year. Calendars are available on the City's website and may be mailed to you by calling 617-376-1953 or e-mailing recyclequincy@quincyma.gov.

Yardwaste consists of leaves, grass, twigs and small branches. Branches up to 2 ½ inches in diameter must be cut into 3-foot lengths, bundled and tied. Bundles should not weigh more than 50 lbs. Yardwaste must be in paper bags, cardboard boxes or in barrels clearly marked with orange yardwaste stickers. Yardwaste in plastic bags are not accepted. Yardwaste stickers are available for free at City Hall and the Department of Public Works at 55 Sea Street, M-F from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Yardwaste stickers may be mailed your residence by calling 617-376-1953 or e-mailing recyclequincy@quincyma.gov.

Yardwaste may be brought to the DPW yard at 55 Sea Street, M-F 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on Saturdays, mid-April through mid-December, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Proof of residency with a Driver's License is required.



Quincy's Parks and Recreation

The city of Quincy possesses 52 municipal park locations, 10 municipal beach areas and numerous open space areas. There are currently 35 basketball courts, 23 tennis courts, 27 little league/softball fields, 8 regulation baseball diamonds, 5 soccer fields and 3 football fields. We offer a skateboard park and an in-line skate-facility as well. Many of our park areas are multi-use facilities, meaning that during different seasons, they are used for different activities.

The city also offers 18 "tot-lot" or children's playgrounds. There are also 10 other locations with playground equipment for young children to use.

City Annual Events

Christmas Parade and Celebration:

Each year the City of Quincy holds the largest Christmas Parade in the Commonwealth on the Sunday following Thanksgiving. The Parade is part of a week-long celebration of events including Santa's arrival by parachute and the annual 'Turning on the Lights' in McIntyre Mall. Flag Day:

Each year on the Saturday closest to Flag Day (June 14th) the City of Quincy pays tribute to Old Glory with the Quincy Flag Day Parade & Celebration. The 1.2 mile parade steps-off at 7 p.m. at the intersection of Coddington and Hancock Streets and proceeds north on Hancock Street to Merrymount Parkway, disbanding at Pageant Field.



Cleaner Greener Quincy

Cleaner Greener Quincy is an annual community event held on the first Saturday in May where residents come together to clean parks and public spaces across the City. Volunteers are given free t shirts, and a cookout at Pageant Field is held after the clean up is completed

Dorothy Quincy Homestead

34 Butler Road

Quincy, MA 02169

This charming colonial estate - parts of which date to 1685 - was home to generations of Quincys, one of Massachusetts' leading families whose descendants included President John Quincy Adams and Oliver Wendell Holmes. The estate was also the childhood home of Dorothy Quincy, wife of John Hancock, the first signer of the Declaration of Independence and first governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. During the pre-Revolutionary War years, the Quincy Homestead was a meeting place for patriots such as John Adams, Josiah Quincy, Benjamin Franklin and Hancock.

Dedicated in 2001, this life-size bronze statue of the “Atlas of Independence” was designed by sculptor Lloyd Lillie. (A second statue of John Adams can be found in Freedom Park on Burgin Parkway.)

The newly renovated playground at Faxon Park is now open. The \$450,000 project, funded by a State grant and Community Preservation Act funds, created the finest playground in the City and made substantial improvements to the entrance to Faxon Park.
