

Amendment to original order 2014 - 034 for replacement of windows and exterior doors at the Merrymount Elementary School, Wollaston Elementary School and North Quincy High School

Ordered: That the Loan Order adopted by this Council on February 18, 2014, which Loan Order appropriated \$5,338,930, to be raised by borrowing, for the purpose of paying costs of replacing windows and exterior doors at the Merrymount Elementary School, located at 4 Agawam Road, the Wollaston Elementary School, located at 205 Beale Street and at the North Quincy High School, located at 316 Hancock Street, all in the City of Quincy, including the payment of all costs incidental or related thereto, is hereby amended in its entirety to provide as follows:

Ordered: That the City appropriates Five Million Nine Hundred Eighteen Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$5,918,930) for the purpose of paying costs of replacing windows and exterior doors at the Merrymount Elementary School, located at 4 Agawam Road, the Wollaston Elementary School, located at 205 Beale Street and at the North Quincy High School, located at 316 Hancock Street, all in the City of Quincy, including the payment of all costs incidental or related thereto (the "Projects"), which proposed repair projects would materially extend the useful life of each school and preserve assets that otherwise are capable of supporting the required educational program, and for which the City has applied for a grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"), said amount to be expended under the direction of the City of Quincy Public Buildings Department. To meet this appropriation the Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, is authorized to borrow said amount under M.G.L. Chapter 44, or pursuant to any other enabling authority. The City acknowledges that the MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and if the MSBA's Board of Directors votes to invite the City to collaborate with the MSBA on these proposed repair projects, any costs the City incurs in excess of any grant that may be approved by and received from the MSBA for the Projects shall be the sole responsibility of the City; provided further that any grant the City may receive from the MSBA for the Projects shall not exceed the lesser of (1) 69.74% of eligible, approved project costs, as determined by the MSBA, or (2) the total maximum grant amount determined by the MSBA; and that the amount of borrowing authorized pursuant to this vote shall be reduced by any grant amount set forth in the Project Funding Agreement or Agreements that may be executed between the City and the MSBA with respect to the Projects.

Further Ordered: That the City Treasurer is authorized to file an application with The Commonwealth of Massachusetts' Municipal Finance Oversight Board to qualify under Chapter 44A of the General Laws any and all bonds or notes of the City authorized by this vote, and to provide such information and execute such documents as the Municipal Finance Oversight Board of The Commonwealth of Massachusetts may require.

To meet this appropriation the Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, is authorized to borrow said amount under M.G.L. Chapter 44, or pursuant to any other enabling authority. The City acknowledges that the MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and if the MSBA's Board of Directors votes to invite the City to collaborate with the MSBA on these proposed repair projects, any costs the City incurs in excess of any grant that may be approved by and received from the MSBA for the Projects shall be the sole responsibility of the City; provided further that any grant the City may receive from the MSBA for the Projects shall not exceed the lesser of (1) 71.16% of eligible, approved project costs, as determined by the MSBA, or (2) the total maximum grant amount determined by the MSBA and that the amount of borrowing authorized pursuant to this vote shall be reduced by any grant amount set forth in the Project Funding Agreement or Agreements that may be executed between the City and the MSBA with respect to the Projects.

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Area Planning Area Planning Council (MAPC) is a regional planning agency that serves the 101 cities and towns in the Metropolitan Boston region and seeks to promote smart growth and regional collaboration.

WHEREAS, in 2010 MAPC was awarded a \$4 million Federal Sustainable Communities Grant, which aimed to support the implementation of the Boston metropolitan area's Regional Plan entitled "MetroFuture" through local planning efforts, state and regional policy work, development of tools and data, and capacity building for local residents and leaders.

WHEREAS, with Sustainable Communities Grant funding, MAPC worked with the Quincy Planning and Community Development Department and other City Departments to develop the "Quincy Bicycle and Pedestrian Network Plan," which analyzed the existing pedestrian and cycling environments in the City of Quincy, and provides recommendations for low-cost, short-term and longer-term bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure enhancements.

WHEREAS, the City of Quincy Bicycle and Pedestrian Network Plan creates a network of bicycle and pedestrian facilities based almost entirely upon existing rights-of-way with no changes to curb locations, and provides safe connections to regional bicycle and pedestrian networks to the north and west (Boston and Milton) and to the South (Weymouth and Braintree).

WHEREAS, the Quincy Bicycle Commission in an endorsement letter dated January 27, 2014 found that the Plan's recommendations will encourage cycling as a safe, viable means of transportation in the City of Quincy.

WHEREAS, on January 15, 2014, the Quincy Planning Board endorsed the Quincy Bicycle and Pedestrian Network Plan and now considers the recommendations contained therein in its review of site plan review and special permit applications.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the City Council does hereby endorse the 2014 Quincy Bicycle and Pedestrian Network Plan and the recommendations contained therein.

Resolution to Repair Streets and Sidewalks in the City of Quincy

WHEREAS, the City of Quincy maintains 247 miles of roadway and 320 miles of sidewalks; and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 90 funding has not kept pace with the needs of our roadway infrastructure; and,

WHEREAS, the City continues to grow through residential development, which in turn places more vehicles on our roads;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council encourages the Koch Administration to strongly consider this issue while preparing the capital expenditures for the FY 16' budget;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council encourages the Koch Administration to study the feasibility of a Capital Plan to augment the Chapter 90 funding to improve the condition of streets and sidewalks in the City of Quincy.
